Humans have been crafting wooden bowls and utensils since the dawn of time.

Today, these simple objects offer a tactile, almost primal experience that connects us to our roots. Unlike many modern materials, wood is a 100% natural element and it remains entirely natural at the end of their journey. Their energy footprint is minimal—or even nonexistent—making them a choice that feels as timeless as the hands that shape them. And yes, they are biodegradable (but I'd prefer you cherish them a little longer).

Most of the wood bowls, vessels, and hollow forms I create are made from 100% storm-damaged or dead fall trees found within a mile of my home and shop. The wood species I work with reflect the hardwood forests of South-Central Indiana—Maples, Oaks, Cherry, Sycamore, Hickory, Walnut and more. These trees are the roots of my world.
